




COVID-19 progression in Africa


April 4, 2020 Confirmed cases: 8,602

March 13, 2021 Confirmed cases: 4,027,046




The Global Fund's support to countries' COVID-19 response

The Global Fund responded immediately to the pandemic by awarding **US\$ 988 million** to **106** countries and **14** multi-country programs to support their responses to COVID-19


COVID-19 Response Mechanism funding by priority areas and type




Uganda: Successful rollout of testing through strong health systems and community responses _____

- ➤ Global Fund approved \$ 62 million to Uganda to adapt existing HIV, TB and malaria programs, purchase PPE for front-line health workers, diagnostics and medical supplies, and to deploy prevention campaigns
- ➤ Health systems built to fight the three infectious diseases over the last two decades were the backbone of Uganda's response to COVID-19
 - A robust network of laboratories and surveillance systems combined with well-trained epidemiologists
 - Existing transport system for samples, diagnostic machines for TB, data management system
- Ministry of Health decentralized laboratory testing services that allowed for wider coverage of testing across the country

Cumulative tests in Uganda








The Global Fund is the world's largest multilateral provider of grants for strengthening systems for health

Global Fund investments significantly contribute to building resilient and sustainable systems for health, supporting countries in a wide range of areas




Overall RSSH investments in 2020-2022 allocation cycle

Based on signed grants for 2020-2022 allocation (as of Jan. 2021)


RSSH investment is 24% of total investment

- "Direct" RSSH funding from RSSH modules, strengthens the health system broadly, e.g. investments in health management information system (HMIS)
- "Contributory" RSSH funding are investments in disease programs that provide benefits to the health system, e.g. training CHWs on malaria in pregnancy & Integrated Community Case Management.

The Global Fund is a major player in the global public health market

- > Every year \$ 2 billion is used for procurement of medicines and health products
- > Implementers are able to procure medicines and health products through three channels
 - Global Fund's Pooled Procurement Mechanism (\$ 1 billion/year spent)
 - National procurement mechanisms
 - Other procurement agents (Global Drug Facility, UNOPS, etc)









Maximizes buyers' purchasing power by pooling demand








The Global Fund is the primary mechanism for delivering COVID-19 tests to Africa


